STAGED RESPONSE TO SUPPORTING BEHAVIOUR

We have had a positive start to the 2024 school year, there are many new supports and processes that we have put in place that support students to engage in their learning and support their personal growth.

The implementation of consistent classroom routines across the school has seen settled classrooms and calm learning environments. Entry and exit routines, with clear transitions between the different stages of learning in the lesson, are supported by the explicit teaching of behaviour expectations in all classrooms.

At the start of the year we presented to students and families our new Staged Response to Supporting Behaviour. This process is being used by all staff in the school to set high expectations for behaviour and learning and supports the application of clear and consistent consequences for unacceptable behaviour. It has been very pleasing to see positive behaviour data as a result of the implementation of the Staged Response.

Elements of the Staged Response that we need the support of families include:

Uniform - Families will receive text messages when students are not in correct uniform. Students who have received 4 text messages will receive an after school detention to support their learning of expected behaviour. Families are reminded that black and grey clothing items are not part of our uniform, nor are non school jackets, hooded jumpers or leggings. While the weather is currently warm, the uniform looks great, please start to plan for the cooler weather and ensure students have correct uniform.

Homeroom - We have changed the structure of homeroom this year to 4x 8min sessions and 1x16 min session on a Friday. There is now an attitude and effort report that will be written based on a student's engagement with homeroom, contributing to a student's overall performance. Starting from next week, if a student is absent from 3 homerooms in a week, they will complete a lunchtime detention. If they miss 4 or more homerooms in a week, they will receive an after school detention. We are working hard to make homeroom an engaging space for students to regulate prior to period 1 and ask that you support us with ensuring your child is attending.

Detentions - This year we have formalised our detention processes. House detentions are held on a Thursday night from 3:30pm - 4:30pm in House offices, a student who fails to attend a House detention, will be enrolled in a Principal detention the following week, failure to attend a Principal detention, will result in a student being suspended. As part of the Staged Response, many staff are holding restorative conversations during breaks to reteach students the expected behaviour and to set goals for positive behaviour moving forward.

Communication with home - You may have noticed that there has been more communication with home this year. Minor posts are visible to parents on Compass, staff are calling home when students are absent or to follow up on behaviours in class. We believe that if we can build a strong relationship with home, then we are in a better position to support students to thrive at school. We thank all of our families for your support and hope to continue to build these important relationships.

EXCITING SUSTAINABILITY NEWS

Warrnambool College is officially registered as a charity organisation under the Container Deposit Scheme. This means when you are depositing eligible cans and bottles you can choose to donate your refund to the Warrnambool College Sustainability Team to put towards bigger and better projects.

CAMPS, SPORTS & EXCURSIONS FUND APPLICATIONS

The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund helps eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities.

If you have a valid means-tested concession card, such as a Veterans Affairs Gold Card, Centrelink Health Care Card or Pensioner Concession Card, or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible. There is also a special consideration category for asylum seeker and refugee families.

Payment amount this year is \$250 for eligible secondary school students. Payments are made direct to the school to use towards expenses relating to camps, excursions and sporting activities for the benefit of your child.

If you applied for CSEF through our school last year, you do not need to complete an application form this year, unless there has been a change in your family circumstances. New Year 7 families will need to complete a form. Please contact the school office on 5564 4444 and ask for an application form. Alternatively you can download the form, and find out more about the program and eligibility, on the Department of Education Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund web page, via the QR code.

MOBILE PHONE POLICY

A reminder that the Department of Education has in place a mobile phone ban that requires students who bring mobiles phones to school to have them switched off and securely put away during school hours. The Department is requiring all schools to ensure this ban is in place and enforced from the start of the 2024 school year. The ban applies equally to all government schools right across the state. This helps ensure that school is a learning environment free from unnecessary distractions and disruptions. By ensuring mobile phones are kept away at recess and lunch times, students can interact with each other face-to-face, without the distractions and social pressures that mobile phones can cause.

NATIONALLY CONSISTENT COLLECTION OF DATA on School Students with Disability (NCCD)

Every year, all schools in Australia participate in the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD). The NCCD process requires schools to identify information already available in the school about supports provided to students with disability. These relate to legislative requirements under the Disability Discrimination Act 1992 and the Disability Standards for Education 2005, in line with the NCCD guidelines (2019).

Information provided about students to the Australian Government for the NCCD includes:

- year of schooling
- category of disability: physical, cognitive, sensory or social/emotional
- level of adjustment provided: support provided within quality differentiated teaching practice, supplementary, substantial or extensive.

This information assists schools to:

- formally recognise the supports and adjustments provided to students with disability in schools
- consider how they can strengthen the support of students with disability in schools
- develop shared practices so that they can review their learning programs in order to improve educational outcomes for students with disability.

The NCCD provides state and federal governments with the information they need to plan more broadly for the support of students with disability. The NCCD will have no direct impact on your child and your child will not be involved in any testing process. The school will provide data to the Australian Government in such a way that no individual student will be able to be identified – the privacy and confidentiality of all students is ensured. All information is protected by privacy laws that regulate the collection, storage and disclosure of personal information. STARTING WITH A BUZZ

The Careers office has been buzzing with activity for the beginning of 2024 with lots of student visits and positive discussions around what this year will look like. This year, students enrolled in VCE-VM are involved in Structured Workplace Learning (SWL) placements. Of our 95 students involved in this program, 70 of those students are already linked with a host employer and have either commenced or are due to commence very soon. So wonderful to see our students getting some real hands on experiences with their industry of choice.

CONGRATULATIONS to the class of 2023!!!

97% of students who applied for university have been offered a place to study this year as well as a significant portion of the cohort launching confidently into full time traineeships and apprenticeships. 
