DRUMMER FEATURES IN NATIONAL INDUSTRY MAGAZINE

Congratulations to Warrnambool College alum David Parkes who has gained national acclaim, featuring in the latest edition of DRUMScene magazine.

The talented touring and session drummer, who graduated from Warrnambool College in 2016 and taught at the college in 2017, is building a name for himself in the music industry due to his strong work ethic, focus, creative puzzle-solving skills and cool confidence.

The article highlights his career to date including being a member in progressive metal bands Wallet Inspector and I Built The Sky, which toured the UK and Europe in 2023.

The article commended the fill-in drummer's ability to learn and perform unknown material "quickly and thoroughly" with very limited preparation time.

He's filled in for diverse acts including Japanese band Paledusk and Australian artists including post-hardcore band The Amity Affliction, metalcore band Alpha Wolf, singer/ songwriter Dan Sultan and electronic artist Running Touch.

The article said David "confidently deliver(s) the goods" and was "blowing people away with his immense talent and abilities under pressure to deliver the highest quality performance, every time".

David said memorising songs at such short notice was "pretty wild" and he focused on keeping cool under pressure. "You've got to remind yourself: you can do it," he told DRUMScene.

"In a way it made me realise the human mind and body can do amazing things. When you really believe and work hard you can get it done."

Warrnambool College director of instrumental music Erin Toulmin described David as a high achiever, a committed and passionate musician and a brilliant teacher. Ms Toulmin said David had remained humble despite his fame, a key characteristic he'd displayed throughout his secondary schooling.


HOMETOWN HERO GETS CALL UP FOR TRIPLE J'S ONE NIGHT STAND


