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PRINCIPAL MESSAGE

Thanks for your support throughout this very challenging term. Returning to face-to-face teaching after two years of COVID and remote learning has had its complications. We have spent a lot of time promoting our ready to learn behaviours to ensure that all students are in uniform, on time and have correct materials with their phones in their lockers. We appreciate your support with this at home as two years of remote learning has added a layer of difficulty to school life in 2022. We encourage feedback as always as we continually strive to support your children to be the best versions of themselves.

Last week on Friday 10th June we had a school led Professional Development Day with the focus on staff 'topping up their toolkit'. We relied on expertise in our current staffing profile to lead various workshop options including curriculum development, differentiation, parent communication, numeracy and literacy. The Principal team are extremely proud of the knowledge and proficiency of our leadership team to be able to coordinate professional development sessions to build the capacity of our staff. The feedback from the day was fantastic with staff being able to choose the options to 'top up their toolkit' with the sessions that staff felt was important to them and their role at the College.

This will hopefully lead to improved aspirations leading into their senior years of schooling by increasing their awareness of career pathway opportunities. The Industry Connection Program celebration event is on in the last week of term, Wednesday June 22nd from 2pm-4pm in the Hall and we would love all Year 9 parents to attend. A WHIRLWIND TERM

Wow – what a fast-moving, whirlwind term! We were renewed by our learnings from last Friday's pupil-free Professional Development Day for all staff with our focus on maintaining an unconditional positive regard for all students and each other, while continuing our focus on Structuring Lessons framed by the High Impact Engagement Strategy (HIES) of Explicit Behavioural Expectations. We have had our Year 11 Outdoor Education students out on Camp, enjoyed a Hopkins House Celebration Day with a Splash of Blue for Men's Mental Health, a Studio Art excursion to Warrnambool Art Gallery and Year 9 Presentations to Industry.

In recent weeks we have seen a renewed effort from students wearing the correct uniform which is a fantastic outcome of our School Wide Positive Behaviour focus on uniform, especially during the very cold and wet wintery weather we have been experiencing! Students have responded well to a new merit post that has been created for teachers to reward students' efforts in this area and we thank you for your support with uniform at home.

We are looking to reward students as much as possible for positive behaviour, for all our 'Ready to Learn' expectations – including uniform – and students' efforts in the classroom, the yard and on excursions. The merit system is already built with rewards attached to it which is tracked, and we are really looking for every opportunity to recognise students who have made positive changes, students who are doing great things, the quiet achievers and those who often fly under the radar. Our focus on the positives is how we aim to finish off the term before the holidays, with merit prizes issued to students in final House assemblies like an episode of Oprah – "You can have a pen! And you can have a pen! Everyone can have a pen!!"

Student voice is a consideration too – some teachers have been working to maintain a positive classroom climate by letting students decide who gets the merit for the lesson - a criteria is set and students know the expected behaviour to be nominated. This is a fantastic example of student voice, peer recognition and mutual respect!



With one week to go students are madly finishing off CATs and completing SACs, with the end of Units 1 and 3 for our VCE and VCAL students winding up and Year 7 to 10s working hard to achieve an S for the Semester in each of their subjects. Reports will be published on Friday the 24th June at 3:30pm, and we encourage all parents to review student progress at this half-way point in the year. With the opportunity to check in as usual on how your child has been assessed by their teachers in terms of their Attitude and Effort and Academic performance since the last reporting cycle, you can also develop a good understanding of where your child is sitting against the Victorian Curriculum Achievement Standards and whether or not they have been able to achieve an S for Semester 1, with full completion of their coursework to a satisfactory standard.

Please take the time to navigate Compass to check your child's Learning Task results for explicit feedback. This is an opportunity to celebrate the wins and the learning progress your child has achieved and find ways together to provide support where it is needed, in what has been a very challenging adjustment to a post-Covid world of life back at school.

Please note that along with the release of reports next Friday we are looking for your valuable feedback on our reporting processes and what's working for you. There will be a quick survey we would love you to complete as part of our ongoing efforts to ensure you feel as involved as possible and know how to access all information to understand where your child is at in terms of their learning progress.

Next term on Wednesday 28th July we will be holding our Subject Expo night. An important night to attend given the incoming changes to be implemented from next year with our shift to the VCE Vocational Major replacing Intermediate and Senior VCAL and the new Victorian Pathways Certificate (VPC) replacing Foundation VCAL for senior students. Please put this date on your calendar so that you are ready for the parent/student/teacher pathway interviews to follow - understanding where your child is at now in terms of their learning progress and future goals is crucial!

Finally, don't forget that the last day of term will be a shortened day with different bell times for Periods 1-4 so that we finish up at 2:30pm. Happy holidays everyone!

CHANGES TO VCE



VICTORIA'S SENIOR SECONDARY EDUCATION IS CHANGING.

From 2023, the new VCE Vocational Major will replace Intermediate and Senior VCAL. This means the VCE will recognise different students equally. The new Victorian Pathways Certificate (VPC) will replace Foundation VCAL for senior students requiring flexibility in their learning. Students will have more education choices, a higher-quality curriculum and better workplace experiences – preparing them for further study, training at TAFE or work. From 2023, more students will study the VCE.

That is because the VCE will include the Vocational Major, a 2-year program that sits within the VCE. The changes are a result of the Review into Vocational and Applied Learning Pathways in Senior Secondary Schooling (the Firth review).

Warrnambool College will switch to the VCE Vocational Major from 2023.

This change makes the Subject Expo and associated parent/student/teacher pathway interviews in Term 3, week 3 even more important.

Teachers and careers counsellors will be available to answer questions and to support students as they make decisions about their final years at school.



Once completed they put the equipment to the test and it was great seeing the boomerangs flying around, (target practice was an issue as a few were claimed by nearby trees). All in all, the boys appreciated the experience and learnt a lot.



HOME TOWN LINKS


