

ALUMNI UPDATE



We celebrated our inaugral Open Day with many memories shared.



former teachers and students gathered for the inaugural Warrnambool College Alumni Open Day which included a historic display with items dating back to the early 1900s. The College, which is Victoria's second oldest government secondary school, opened its doors to the alumni community on April 29, with attendees soaking up its history and reminiscing about their school experiences with a College tour.

The open day was held to coincide with the May Racing Carnival to encourage racegoers returning home to visit. It is hoped it will be held annually. The event, which also marked 30 years since the amalgamation of Warrnambool North Technical School and Warrnambool High School, included reflections from then-principals Russell Isaac (North Tech) and Ray Welsford (WHS and then WC).

Archive items included one of the first handwritten student registers from the early 1900s, copies of the school magazines including The Breeze from 1914 onwards, class photos, newspaper clippings and other items.

Matthew Monk, who was one of four Warrnambool College captains in 1994, also shared some of his memories of the amalgamation.

Principal Dave Clift said it was great to see alumni from various eras engage and reflect on their school days and the new event was a chance to see all the amazing things happening at the College.

"It's incredibly exciting to see alumni from Warrnambool North Technical School and Warrnambool High School sharing their perspectives and the histories of both schools," Mr Clift said.

"We hope and anticipate this is the first of many events to be held in coming years as we support the school community to discover and rediscover what Warrnambool College looks like in the 21st century."

Uniform Policy



Students of Warrnambool College are required to abide by the uniform dress code. A school uniform enables students to develop a sense of pride & identification with our school community. It promotes equality amongst students & ensures health & safety within the school environment.

Students are expected to wear the Warrnambool College uniform with pride. Uniforms should always be neat and clean in appearance. Students wearing the uniform at any time are representing the College; they are required to wear the uniform correctly and abide by the College Code of Conduct until they have arrived home and changed.

In accordance with OHS guidelines and risk minimisation strategies, decorative jewellery is not permitted to be worn to school. Ear piercings and one nose ring is permitted provided these are sleepers or studs.

Please note, students are strongly encouraged to wear a SunSmart hat when outside during terms 1 and 4. A College beanie is also available to purchase and can be worn in terms 2 and 3 when outside. Hats and beanies are available for purchase from Lowes at Gateway Plaza.

- The sports uniform must be worn to school for timetabled PE classes and inter-school competitions. It can also be worn on regular school days. Students in the Sporting Pathway Program (SPP) are permitted to wear their SPP uniform on any school day.
- Students in school academies are permitted to wear approved academy polo shirts on any school day.
- If students are not in full school uniform on the day of a school excursion, they may not be permitted to attend.



At Warrnambool College our flexible uniform policy allows students to choose uniform options from the list on the next page that they are most comfortable in.

Sports uniform and SPP uniform should be worn on days when students have practical classes.
