This term it has been great to settle into a positive rhythm of teaching and learning, with fewer interruptions each week as all our classes work through curriculum units carefully planned by our teaching staff. I've certainly enjoyed seeing many of the classes working diligently and collaboratively through the new learning expected each school day.

Despite this relative sense of settledness in classes, there has been a number of changes in our school leadership this term to support some of our staff in taking extended leave. This semester our Assistant Principal, Jen Penn, has stepped into the role of Acting Principal at Ararat Secondary College. This will align our school leadership team with our change to school structure in 2026 in moving to a year level based student support system.

JOINING THE WARRNAMBOOL COLLEGE COMMUNITY

I would like to begin by thanking the Warrnambool College community for the warm welcome I have received since joining this term. Leaving Mildura after a decade serving their community—including roles such as Assistant Principal at Mildura Senior College and Learning Specialist at Red Cliffs Secondary College—was a significant shift. Returning to the hills and windy weather of Warrnambool has meant being closer to family, high school friends, and the community I am proud to call my own.

From my first day, staff have been kind and supportive, and I have already seen excellent teaching across classrooms. Our students have also made a strong impression—many have introduced themselves, showing the kind of respect and consideration that speaks volumes about the culture at Warrnambool College. I am particularly impressed by the work and leadership of our School Captains, who model the College values with energy and pride.

We have also recently reviewed our NAPLAN data. Pleasingly, by Year 9, Warrnambool College students performing at strong or exceeding levels were well above the state average. This is not a one-off but a sustained trend over the last three years, reflecting the hard work of our staff and students, supported by families.

PROCESS REMINDERS

As we continue to build on our culture of high expectations, I'd like to remind families of some key processes that support consistency across the school:

Lanyard System – Students leaving class to access lockers, bathrooms, or resources must wear the out-of-class lanyard. Alongside Compass tracking, this ensures safety, accountability, and responsibility. Thank you to all students for embracing this change.

Compass Updates – Families are encouraged to check Compass regularly. Posts relating to student movement (House, Wellbeing, Careers, sick bay, or self-regulation spaces) are visible to parents and help keep communication transparent.

Consistent Routines – Staff continue to reinforce clear routines and Tier 1 strategies in every classroom. These support students to be ready to learn and to understand expectations both at school and as they prepare for adult life.

We know building consistency takes time and persistence, but already we are seeing positive change. Together—staff, students, and families—we are creating an environment that is orderly, supportive, and focused on learning. Thank you for your ongoing partnership in supporting your child's education.



It's ok to ask for help - supporting our teens.



A Guide for Parents & Carers

Being able to ask for help when we need it is an essential skill and it takes practice to get right. Asking for help can be really hard to do, no matter how big or small the problem is. As a parent or carer, you play an important role in encouraging positive help-seeking.

Why Young People Might Not Ask For Help

- They feel embarrassed or ashamed
- They don't think its serious enough
- Worry about what others might think
- They don't know how to ask.
- They don't want to be a burden

How You Can Support Your Young Person

- 1. Start the Conversation "Everyone needs help sometimes. I'm always here to listen."
- 2. Model Help-Seeking Share times when you've asked for help
- 3. Listen without Judgement Focus on listening calmly and openly before offering advice. "Would you like me to problem-solve or just listen?"
- 4. Praise Effort to Speak Up Even a small step (like telling you they're stressed or sad) is a big deal. Acknowledge it. "That took courage - thank you for telling me."
